Horses: cuwc, soos - from an unused root mean. to skip, a horse (as leaping); also a swallow (from its rapid flight) crane, horse. (Jeremiah 8:7 translated: turtledove & crane)

Horsemen: parash - a steed (as stretched out to a vehicle, not single nor for mounting, also (by impl.) a driver (in a chariot), i.e. (collect.) cavalry: horseman.
